


# From the President

## Discipleship & Leadership

We have a Discipleship & Leadership program at LCBI. Just like we did years ago, we divide our student body into four houses. What were formerly Venus, Jupiter, Mars and Saturn houses are now Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. In each of these house are five teams: Academic, Faith & Life, Health & Wellness, Community Service and Arts & Drama. Each student can choose which team they are on, but they must be on *a* team. Standing outside looking in is not an option at LCBI.

As an example of how the above works, the Faith & Life teams are responsible for Friday devotions and organizing Faith & Life events at the school. The Community Service teams help organize our 'Take Out Tuesdays' where the students and staff serve at various loca-

tions in the community. Each team plays an active role in the driving programs at LCBI.

## **Objective Assessment**

Anxiety and depression are a focal point in education for this generation. Amidst the myriad of information, it behooves us to know what is true or false, what is necessary, what we should be interested in. Noise clutters!

To measure our progress in this regard, we submit to a student-completed survey (OurSchool) that is conducted nationwide. We can compare LCBI to a national standard. Of note is that we receive students with high anxiety, largely in Grades 9 and 10. By the time a second- or third-year student reaches Grade 12, LCBI students are at half the anxiety of the national value. Where Christ's spirit is present, grace is present, and peace is present.

The dedication of our faculty and staff remains outstanding. They tithe to the school, putting in hours that make their roles nearly 24/7. The concern for each student's well-being is paramount. Faculty and staff are here for the students. LCBI students experience worship, friendship and community. Combined with Mattea's own very hard work, this community effort is also the reason that her success (*cover story*) comes through LCBI.

## Letter-Writing Campaign

As of this writing, the five Historical Schools of Saskatchewan (Athol Murray, Rosthern Junior, Luther, Briercrest Academy, and LCBI) have completed a submittal to the Ministry of Education. The submittal features a request to move our funding from the current 70% of the public school support amount to 80%.

We have had several meetings with MLAs and one productive meeting directly with the Minister of Education (Hon. **Gordon Wyant**). We need prayers, phone calls and letters. To



be clear: prayers to our Father in Heaven, phone calls and letters to MLAs (not the other way around). If you feel so moved, I would be happy to email a draft letter for your signature that can be sent to your MLA.

## **Our Motto Stands Strong**

One hundred and nine years ago, our founders claimed the motto, We Would See Jesus. This motto stands strong; scripture remains the prominent text book guide. Our Discipleship program challenges our students to become servant leaders, giving faithfully in accordance with their God-given gifts. Pray for LCBI that we may continue to lift Jesus that We Would See.

## Life After LCBI: Mattea in Scotland

ello everyone. My name is Mattea Heck, and I graduated from LCBI in 2016. I was given the privilege by LCBI to tell a bit of my story and how I earned a place to study Medicine at the University of St. Andrews in Scotland.

I can't pinpoint an exact moment that led me to decide to study medicine in the United Kingdom. There were a multitude of factors that influenced me: support from my family and teachers, friends who encouraged me, a bunch of hard work and never being told "you can't do that; that's outrageous!"

LCBI was a safe and encouraging environment that let me excel, and to this day I

am the only Saskatchewan resident ever to be accepted into this program.

The process of getting here was interesting. I wrote my clinical entrance exam the summer before I started Grade 12 at LCBI. Throughout Grade 12, I worked hard with my teachers to attain exceptional grades, write a personal statement, and obtain reference letters. All that hard work paid off, and I received an interview and then a spot to study medicine in the "Scottish-Canadian Medical Programme."

I will never forget one of the interview tasks, which was to help an elderly lady

interpret the bus schedule to make it to an appointment and back.

Being from rural Saskatchewan (I grew up in Sceptre), I had never taken a bus, and I had definitely not read a transit schedule. I remember thinking "Stay calm." I immediately said that I had never taken public transport before, but by the end of the five minutes, everything was sorted. Right after the station, I thought I had blown it. Now, looking back, I know they were testing one of modern medicines key principles: never promise things you don't know, and always tell people if you don't know what you are doing. A principle that was taught both in LCBI and in my home is that honesty and integrity will take you further than faking it.


Now to fast forward to where I am now: I am in my fourth year of this six-year program. The program I am in is a double-degree program; I am earning a Bachelor of Science (Honours) and a *Medicinae Baccalaureus Baccalaureus Chirurgiae* (MbCHb). I earned my BSc (Hons) this past summer after writing my dissertation titled "How does

diabetes in pregnancy affect maternal and infant outcomes in North American Aboriginal People?" I am

now into my clinical years, and I have found I absolutely love being with patients every day. The patients motivate me to keep doing all the extra studying and to continue to keep up with my studies of Scots as a "second language."



I plan to move back to Canada to practice medicine in 2022. There are three particular areas that I have developed a passion for: maternal, child and rural health. I hope to pick a specialty in one of these areas. Reflecting back on these past few years is always very humbling, and it makes me very excited for what the future will bring my way after such an incredible 21 years so far.


## **Valedictory Address**
