A New Act for LCBI And Some Other Exciting Changes

ur mission continues in Spirit-led vigour! As you read through this issue of *Beacon*, you will sense joy in our staff as well as a sense of privilege to serve at LCBI.

LCBI staff proceeds with maturity and faith as we continue daily chapels and in-person classes. As much as the media bombards us with news of wars and all sorts of domestic fears, we rest on the petition: Give us today our daily bread.

This summer's Corporation Meeting was significant for the future life of LCBI.

LCBI has its own Act ("An Act to incorporate The Lutheran Collegiate Bible Institute, 1960") and is one of five Historical Schools of Saskatchewan. The board presented a motion to support LCBI operating under a new Act, and this was passed with 91% in favour. We now wait for the Saskatchewan Legislator to finalize the process by changing our Act.

What Will the New Act Mean?

This new Act will restructure our membership with those churches and individuals who desire to work with LCBI upon request. This also means LCBI will host its own AGMs, and we will need to organize these accordingly.

The financial challenges that LCBI faces this year are hefty. We have worked diligently over the last several years

toward a sustainable operation, but we are not there yet. LCBI was in a marginally positive financial position before the various Covid restrictions, and we have ended this last fiscal year — for the fifth year in a row — with a positive net income.

However, increased support from our constituency is clearly needed! Currently, we receive only 80% funding per student from the Saskatchewan government, as compared to the average public school's 100%. We do not charge high tuition to compensate. At this point, we have exhausted our financial savings.

Preparing for the Future

We realize that our student body needs to continue to grow for long-term sustainability. As a promising start, we are now at 100 students on campus. Yet, we are not sustainable under our current model.

To plan for the future, we engaged a consultant (who is an LCBI alum) to prepare a set of recommendations that will elevate our programs. The board has also struck a Tuition & Fees Review Committee, which will determine if there is any need to update tuition and associated fees including board & room.












A Great Year for the Bisons ... So Far!

But after doing this for several summers, my wife and I felt we needed a change. We were fortunate enough to be able to borrow a motorhome from family members. We were set: six weeks of living in a motorhome and a new Canadian adventure. In the motorhome, we were graced from the first kilometer with a great view of the road, and we watched the prairie sky change hour by hour.

After three weeks in Saskatchewan, it was time to take the journey west and experience the mountains for Alberta. We visited some good friends at Lake Diefenbaker for a couple days, then

departed in the early morning to make the long trek to Alberta, passing through Outlook on the way.

When we turned on the #15 highway to go west towards Outlook, my mind became flooded with many memories from "life at the College."


Your Donations Keep LCBI in the Black

hat a blessing it is to be back again for what will (hopefully) be another full year of in-person schooling! It was so great to have the students on campus all of last year, to see sports teams back in action, and to host a live musical! And for the first time since 2019, we were able to have a "normal" Grad.

Student numbers are on the rise, which is also encouraging. Our financial situation has stabilized! However, we still need the continued support of

you, our Alumni and friends. While the provincial Education Grant is our single largest source of income, Donations (including estates and Homecoming) account for nearly a third of our annual revenue budget.

As you can see in the graph, we still rely very heavily on Donations to sustain our operations (including salaries and utilities). And with a growing student base, we will need to increase our staffing in several areas so that we can provide adequate support. Your donations are as important as ever. Thank you for sending them in.

Our improved financial situation has allowed us to address a few critical facility issues (e.g., leaking roofs), but more work will have to be done to maintain and hopefully upgrade/update our aging facilities.

We are projecting a balanced Budget for FY 2022–23. Right now, the projected budget provides for some added support for student counselling and Campus Life—as well as covering rising food, fuel, and debt servicing costs. However, it allocates only a small amount for much needed capital projects. We would like to undertake a number of projects (see Wish List sidebar) in the near future,

but we will only be able to do so if funds allow. None of these projects costs a lot, and each of them would enhance our students' experiences at LCBI. Your gifts can make them possible.

If you are a casual donor, please consider becoming a monthly donor, either by credit card through CanadaHelps, by e-transfer to accountant@lcbi.sk.ca or through our CAFT Sustaining Donor automatic debit program. If you are already a monthly donor, please consider increasing that monthly donation.



As God Provides, So Will We Move: Overcoming Challenge in LCBI's Past

President Hove asked Dan to share a brief outline of the challenges and successes he'd experienced during his almost-19 years working at LCBI. Dan writes: "So many events will be missed. But here are a few."

n 1983, I was first hired to work primarily in Public Relations. The major PR event of the year was a project named "Stepping Forward." This project featuring our Chaplain, Pastor Dave Kaiser, who would take us from Edmonton to Outlook on a route that covered 500 miles.

This was a public relations activity and fundraiser with promotional events scheduled in congregations along the way. Kevin Grant '84B, a Bible School student, drove the Camaro with an LCBI sign on the roof as a pilot car, and Irving Updahl donated the use of his motorhome for our accommodation on the journey.

Several outcomes from this event were striking. We received our target

goal for donations. We reached into many communities. But most of all, this program pushed us all to *step forward* in a time of deep challenge and struggle. It began a quiet testing of life and faith, and eventually it led to a surprising degree of recovery and renewal.

The Stepping Forward Program proved to have other benefits for the many challenges we faced in the years that followed. The 500-mile walk had seemed a formidable and difficult task. Completing it showed us how difficult tasks can be accomplished. We took one step at a time, adjusted for circumstances (such as blisters), and kept our direction.

A Theme to Guide Us


It was easy also in our school's journey to be impatient with all our many needs that had to be addressed. There were times we would have loved to run up deficits to take care of our facilities and to support our faithful staff. But as we saw the risks, we adopted a theme:

"As God provides, so we will move." This theme would prove to offer a needed discipline for our journey as we took each new step and worked together to move forward.

After being away for most of the 1984–85 academic year, I was asked to accept a call to come back to LCBI as President and Business Manager. With the many challenges of finances, facilities and low enrolments, and the general discouragement of the staff, the task seemed almost too formidable to consider.


The Gift of a Good Mentor

I was young and inexperienced, but I was also so fortunate to have a great model and mentor in the person of **Ray**

was a faithful and gifted administrator and teacher. For a rookie President like me, Ray's generous wisdom and support made the difference to get us through that first year. Getting through that year felt like a tremendous achievement, and I was grateful for his mentorship.

Over the years, we managed to upgrade our facilities. A member of our Board of Regents discovered a Federal Program where we could hire people who were on EI (Employment Insurance). The government continued providing

the EI benefits, and we could top them up to provide a reasonable salary. The program also provided some material costs.

In the end, we received three dollars for every dollar spent, and over several years, we were able to complete approximately \$800,000 in renovations to our campus without adding debt. The chapel, dorm residences, and cafeteria were upgraded. The work helped us become less embarrassed by our campus and hugely improved the morale of our students and staff.

Transformation of Campus Culture

Another amazing event was the creation of a new student centre — a major project of our Staff Advisor and the Student Representative Council (SRC). The SRC offered a campus canteen, and between this and a variety of other projects, they totally funded the costs of transforming the lower level of the Chapel into an absolutely beautiful and well equipped student center. This new environment for student life changed the culture on

our campus. The students developed a new pride in their school, and they benefitted from the new opportunities for fellowship on campus that this space provided.

What the student center did for the students, the new classroom facilities seemed to do for everyone. New and renewed classrooms, new science labs, a new library, a new computer lab, and even a new fitness center attached to our Gymnasium were necessary and greatly appreciated improvements.

The Impossible Dream ... Was Not

Our faculty and staff and our whole student body achieved what had seemed an impossible dream. A generous estate gift, together with support from a host of alumni and friends of LCBI (and a 20% capital grant from Sask. Ed.) allowed us to complete this project debt-free. As God provided, LCBI stepped forward. The new and renovated educational space was so needed and deserved by our staff and students.

With all the challenges LCBI faced, one of the elements that led to our success was the faithful support of our donors. Our constituency did not give up on us while we wrestled through so many issues. The development of computer technology gave us new equipment to stay in touch with our alumni, supporters and friends. We viewed our donors as co-workers. As an appreciation of our co-workers, a new letter was included with every donation receipt to give each a glimpse of the task we shared.

Trust is a Fragile Gift

We tried to be honest about our deficiencies while we worked to take care of our staff and students, and we made clear our commitment to seek to be stewards of everything with which we were provided. Trust is the fragile gift of relationship. Communication was very demanding of our time, but it was essential to our shared purpose.

I think that for me, the greatest reward of those nineteen years was what our

campus sheltered. It sheltered a growing life and faith in our students — and in us all. Our LCBI alumni continued to spread out, and they brought the fruit of the spirit into so many workplaces and communities. Over the years, Homecomings have reminded us of God's gracious work in so many lives.

The depth of life and faith — and the gifts of our staff and the lives of our students — remain rich memories that are triggered often. Our faculty and staff experienced a quiet growth

in professional qualities that has built an ever-growing vision and care of our student bodies.

I also remember getting up early in the morning to peel potatoes for dinner, which helped pay for some of my tuition."

One member of our class ran down to the next floor to watch him go by — he wasn't successful either. The result of the fall was a broken arm.

I often wonder where many of us would be if we had not attended LCBI? As a farm boy, from a one-room school of 13 students in Grades 1–8 and Corres-

pondence School for Grade 9, without have easy access to a good high school, where would I have ended up later in life? Instead, here at LCBI I received a good academic education and spiritual instruction, thanks to our dedicated teachers.

Looking back, way back, I wouldn't have wanted it any other way. On behalf of myself and the Class of 1962, thank you LCBI for giving us a good start into the rest of our life.

The Legacy of Homecoming at LCBI

he annual weekend Home-coming gathering has evolved through the years. Regardless of the changes, those who have spent time at this school have always treasured an opportunity to get together with former staff and lifelong friends — as we still do today each October.

Over 100 years ago, the students learned, ate, slept, did laundry — and attended classes — all in one building! In 1916, Old Main was the only building on campus, and it was filled from the

basement to the top floor. Close quarters helped to build close friendships!

Thankfully, a Boys' Dorm was soon added, opening in January 1918, and it was also home for some staff families in those early years. That original dorm was replaced with the 'new' Boys' Dorm in 1975.

Because most students lived long distances apart, they really valued opportunities to get together after graduation. Carolie (Kopperud) Haug '47 asked her friend, Helen (Hagen) Salte '45, also a grad, if they could come up with an idea to get alumni from past years together on campus. Fortunately, Helen was on staff from 1948 to 1950, so she had access to a typewriter. Helen remembers typing

many, many letters!

The two friends got busy sending invitations out to all who had graduated from the early years. Those invitation paid off. By the 50's, former students began to meet for a Homecoming event in October, just after Thanksgiving — a most fitting time to give thanks to God for this School.

At first, the invitation was extended only to classes celebrating their 10, 25, 40 and 50 year anniversaries of graduation.

Now we are happy to gather everyone back for Homecoming on the weekend after Thanksgiving.

We especially recognize each graduating class every five years (i.e., the "Honoured Classes"). Amazingly, we often have alumni attend from 70 and 75 years back! Many are still healthy and hearty.

LCBI has remained an important meeting place even as its name has changed — from the Outlook College to the Saskatchewan Lutheran Bible Institute (SLBI) to the Lutheran Collegiate Bible Institute to the current LCBI High School. Through it all, Old Main is still standing, and our school motto, "We Would See Jesus," still remains our foundation.

One graduate from the Class of 1923, wrote this comment 50 years after her time at the school: "I'm so thankful for the blessings I received at Outlook College, and for the happy years I spent there." Many have shared that sentiment through the years. That's why we always appreciate gathering at Homecoming!

About the Alumni Association

CBI's Alumni Association is the organizing body for the many hundreds who have attended the school or served as staff throughout LCBI's history!

One support that the Association provides is in helping to keep the Alumni contact information updated Leaders for each grad year are asked to touch base with classmates and pass along updates they discover.
